


GETTING TO THE MZES

By bus or tram:

Please visit the Deutsche Bahn website for train time tables: www.bahn.de

Mannheim's main train station is close to the MZES and provides access to ICE and other regional trains. The bus and tram station is directly outside the main exit of the main station. Bus line 60 (destination Grenadierstraße, track 3) will take you directly to the MZES in around 10 minutes (stop: "Universität West"). Visit www.rnv-online.de for local transport schedules and maps.



On foot

The MZES is a 20 minute walk from the main station: exit the main station toward the city center, then cross the tramway tracks and continue straight until you reach a multi-lane road — Bismarckstraße. Turn left here and follow Bismarckstraße for about 1 kilometer. You will pass the Mannheim palace (which is also the university's main building) on your left.

If you are on the same side of the road as the palace, cross Bismarckstraße at the pedestrian light. Continue to walk along Bismarckstraße for another 350 meters on the right side of the street until you reach the grey and blue MZES building A5, 6 (the alphanumeric street names are used in Mannheim's city center which is organized in a grid – see map above). Enter through "Bauteil A". There will be signs directing you to the conference room.

By plane

Frankfurt International Airport is located about 40 minutes from Mannheim Central Station. There are several options to go by train from Frankfurt to Mannheim. Please note that Frankfurt Airport also has two train stations:

1. Fernbahnhof (Long distance railway stations)

Take the Intercity Express (ICE) directly from Frankfurt Flughafen Fernbahnhof to Mannheim Hauptbahnhof. This is the fastest way, but also the most expensive. A return ticket is 50 €.

2. Regionalbahnhof (Regional train station)

The other option is to go to the regional train station and take a regional train to Frankfurt main station. There you can take a Regional Express (RE) to Mannheim. The cost of a return ticket is 38.40 €.


Directions:

From Train station:


- 20 minute walk
- Or take Tram 1 (toward Schönau) or Tram 5 (toward Heidelberg) from platform 3 to "Schloss and walk the rest of the way to the hotel (around 750 m)
